

T2 Return to Campus Award – Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's)

Q. Can I defer the T2 Return to Campus Award offer to a later intake?

A. The T2 Return to Campus Award is currently available for students commencing in Term 2 2023 only and cannot be deferred to later intakes.

Q. How do I accept my offer for the T2 Return to Campus Award?

A. Simply accept your offer of admission via Accept Online. If you have already accepted your offer of admission we will assume you wish to accept the T2 Return to Campus Award unless you contact us in writing to decline the award via enquiry.unsw.edu.au.

Q. Will the T2 Return to Campus Award reduce the deposit I need to pay to accept my offer of admission?

A. No. The deposit required to accept your offer of admission remains unchanged and is outlined in your admission offer and in Accept Online.

Q. I am a current UNSW student and have applied for admission to a new program without completing my current program. Can I hold the Award?

A. No, the T2 Return to Campus Award is available to new students only. Students who have completed an undergraduate program at UNSW and are commencing a postgraduate program will be considered a new student for the purposes of the Award.

Q. I am currently completing/ have completed a UNSW Academic English program. Can I hold the Award?

A. Yes if you meet all eligibility requirements you are permitted to hold the T2 Return to Campus Award.

Q. I have been awarded another scholarship at UNSW. Can I hold the Award?

A. Yes, the T2 Return to Campus Award can be held with other scholarships and awards. It may not be held with a full tuition fee scholarship or the International Student Award.

Q. Can I enrol part time and still hold the Award?

A. No, in order to remain eligible for the Award you must maintain full time enrolment.

Q. If I become a Domestic student (Australian Citizen, Australian Permanent Resident or New Zealand Citizen) can I still hold the Award?

A. No, the Award is for international students only.

Q. If I hold the Award, can I transfer to another program?

A. Only if the new program is an eligible program. The Award is not applicable to students studying a: Master of Laws (9201), Bachelor of Computer Science (3778), Graduate Certificate in Computing (7543), Graduate Diploma in Information Technology (5543), Master of Information Technology (8543), programs offered by AGSM, UNSW Online, UNSW Canberra, UNSW Foundation Programs, UNSW Diploma, Transition Program Online, any program taught in the Hexamester calendar or Study Abroad students).

Q. What are the Terms & Conditions for the Award?

Q. When will I receive payment of the T2 award?

A. Students eligible for the T2 award will receive the payment after the Term 2 census date and no later than 30 June 2023. The payment will be applied to the student's account and will reduce their tuition fee liability for that term.

Q. My fees are due before the census date, should I pay my fees?

A. Yes, we recommend you pay your tuition fees minus the award value before the due date. The payment for your T2 award will be applied to the remaining balance after the T2 census date (25 June) and no later than 30 June 2023.

Please note, until your tuition fees are paid, you will continue to receive automated, UNSW system-generated emails reminding you to pay your tuition fees. However, if you are eligible for the T2 return to Campus Award, the value of the award will be credited by Friday 30 June.

Q. I have already paid my Term 2 fees in full, what will happen to my award entitlement?

A. If you have paid your tuition fees prior to the census date or if the full value of the award is not used in Term 2, the award entitlement will remain in credit on your fee statement and will automatically reduce your fee liability in Term 3.

Q. I have a credit on my account from the T2 return to campus award, can I request refund?

A. No, you cannot receive any portion of the award as a cash refund. The credit may only be applied directly toward tuition fees.
